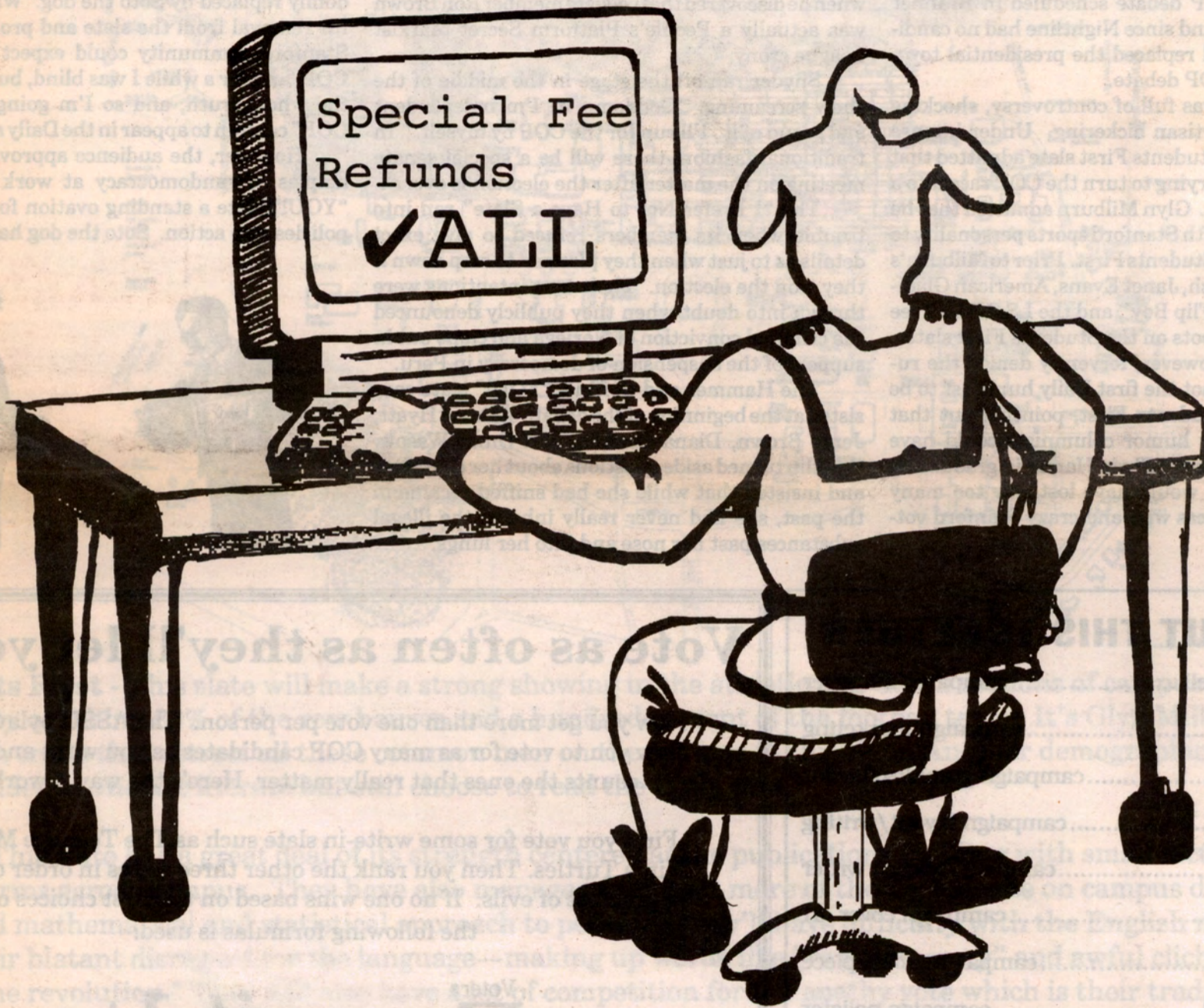

# COPs Debate on "Nightline"

On Friday night, Stanford University reeled under the blow of yet another round of negative national publicity when a Council of Presidents' debate was aired on network television.

After all the National Presidential candidates refused invitations for a special "Nightline at Stanford" town meeting, it appeared likely that the show would be cancelled. However, Ted Koppel, who greatly desired to return to his alma mater and swim once more in the newly refilled Lake Lag, came up with a compromise.

Since the COP debate scheduled in Branner had no audience, and since Nightline had no candidates, Ted Koppel replaced the presidential town meeting with a COP debate.

The debate was full of controversy, shocking surprises, and partisan bickering. Under intense questioning, the Students First slate admitted that they were indeed trying to turn the COP race into a popularity contest. Glyn Milburn admitted that he was actually the fifth Stanford sports personality to be approached by Students First. Prior to Milburn's selection, Bill Walsh, Janet Evans, American Gladiator contestant, "Flip Boy", and the LSJUMB Tree had all declined spots on the Students First slate.

Joel Stein, however, fervently denied the rumor that he was not the first Daily humorist to be approached by Students First, pointing out that none of the other humor columnists could have been chosen because "Chris Harris is graduating and Virginia Tsai would have lost way too many votes among the less wild-and-crazy Stanford voters."

Stein did admit that he had gotten a haircut in order to quell fears about his character. However, he angrily denied that losing his hair had cost him his wit, stating that, "The Samson thing was a one of a kind deal and does not affect all Jews."

The independent COP slates also had some difficulties at the debate. Jason Snyder, who mounted a tremendous advertising campaign for the ASS"U" Senate last year, and who most students still think of fondly whenever they go to the bathroom, seceded from the "A New Era" slate when he discovered that co-slate member Ron Brown was actually a People's Platform Secret Marxist League crony.

Snyder ran off the stage in the middle of the show screaming, "Goddamn it, I'm independent and proud of it. I'll run for the COP by myself." In traditional fashion, there will be a special senate meeting on the matter after the election is over.

The "I Prefer Not to Have a Slate" ran into trouble when its members refused to give exact details as to just when they planned to step down if they won the election. Their true intentions were thrown into doubt when they publicly denounced the criminal conviction of Noriega and came out in support of the suspension of democracy in Peru.

The Hammer and Coffin's "YOU!" slate consisted at the beginning of the debate of David Hyatt, Jerry Brown, Diana Conklin, and Omar Wasow. Wasow protested his removal from the slate and promised that the Stanford community could expect an "I ran for COP, and for a while I was blind, but now I can see the whole truth, and so I'm going to attack the COP" column to appear in the Daily sometime soon.

However, the audience approved of these examples of randomocracy at work and gave the "YOU!" slate a standing ovation for putting their policies into action. Soto the dog had no comment.

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## Vote as often as they'll let you

Now you get more than one vote per person. The ASSU bylaws now allow you to vote for as many COP candidates as you want and it only counts the ones that really matter. Here's the way it works:

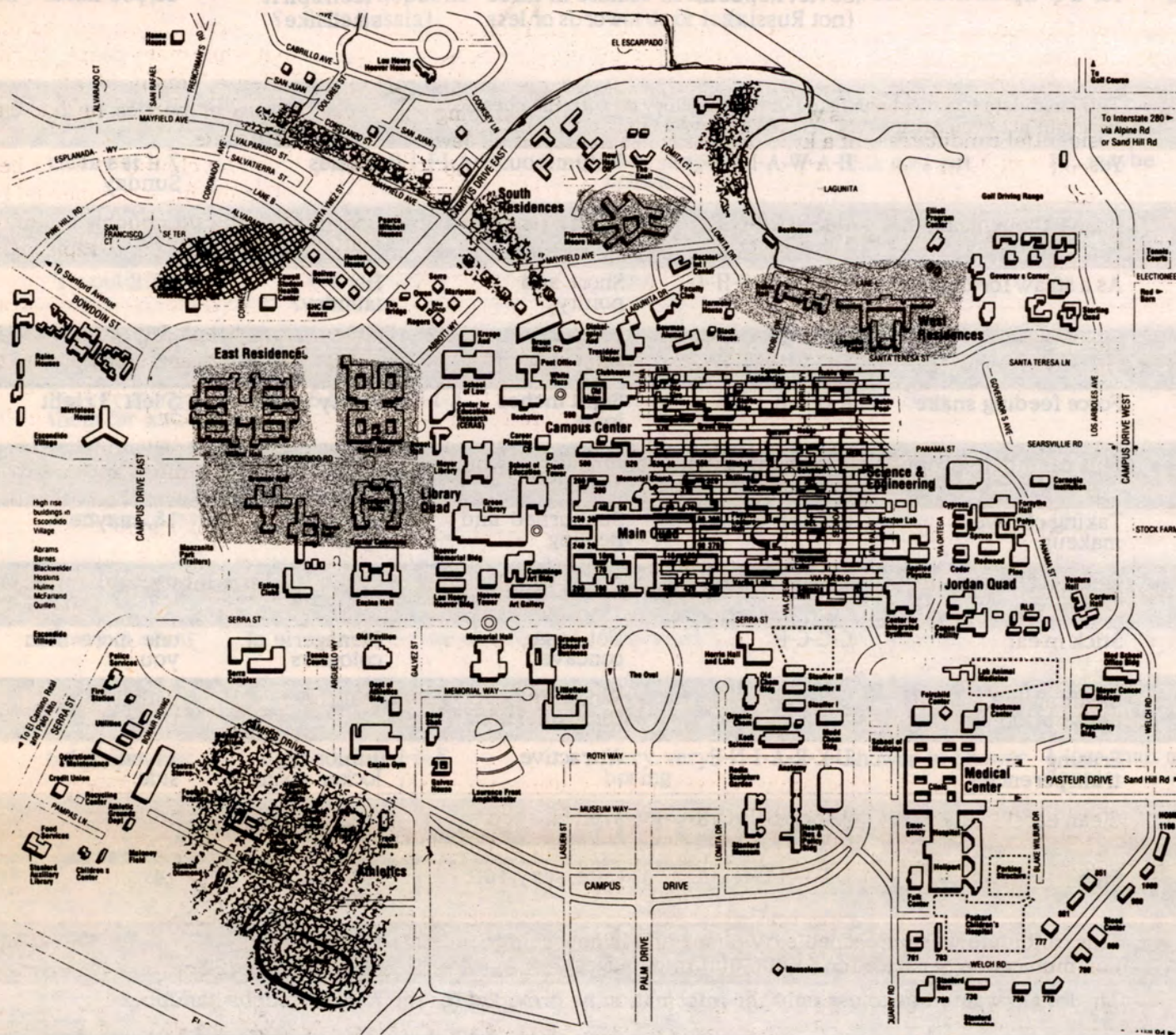
First you vote for some write-in slate such as The Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles. Then you rank the other three slates in order of least to greatest of evils. If no one wins based on the first choices of votes the following formulas is used:

$$\sum_{n=1}^{\text{Voters}} \Psi_n e^{\pi i t} dt$$

Note:  $\Psi$  is the rating given to you on your admission summary card. It is used to weed out the votes of those whom the leaders of the Association do not believe to be capable of making intelligent decisions.

**Students First** - This slate will make a strong showing in the athletic and Greek sections of campus with the possibility of taking 80% of the row houses and a hundred percent of the football team. # Senate Candidates Show Signs of Severe Neurosis

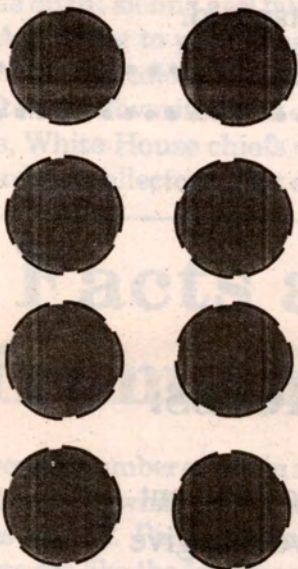
